The election code explicitly states that "attempting to bribe students or buy votes, including providing food and beverages," is a violation. During campaigning, the candidate distributed candy to promote their candidacy and encourage students to listen to them. Even if the candidate did not explicitly exchange candy for votes, the implications are just that. The code prohibits the use of food/beverages in campaign efforts because they function as mental incentives that influence potential voters to support a candidate.

If distributing candy during campaign outreach is considered permissible simply because the candidate did not verbally state their intentions, then the prohibition enforced becomes effectively meaningless, as any candidate could bypass the code by simply avoiding explicit language while still providing food and beverages. Allowing such an action while campaigning gives one candidate an unfair advantage and violates the code.
